Dear students,

Concerning the structure of the Christian Science textbook, we find that the text of "Science and Health" is set. It does not need to be changed. Yet this same text can yield different insights according to our method of approaching it; and changing our method of approach makes it seem as if we have a completely new Textbook before us.

If we approach "Science and Health" with *a religious sense* we may find many marvelous 'religious truths' and experience individually subjective inspiration, but we shall not find its Science. Or, if we read the text with *an atomistic consciousness* we shall find many 'metaphysical facts.' The Textbook appears as a helpful collection of aphorisms, but not as a system of Science. When we study the Textbook with *a structured consciousness* we find something infinitely greater, namely the structure of the one infinite Being, the Science of being.

It is evident that a spiritually structural understanding, being a higher model of understanding than religious sense or atomistic knowledge, expresses itself in a higher demonstration — a higher sense of healing and life-experience.

The Textbook: Our Way of Life

If the Textbook is our way of Life, then we must *follow the invariable order of the chapters in life*, in order to be that being the Textbook presents. As we go from chapter to chapter, we realize that not one single chapter can be side-stepped. If we are just casually reading the Textbook we can, of course, skip chapters as we please, but we cannot do so in demonstrating being. We shall soon find that every chapter necessitates the chapter preceding it and inevitably impels the subject of the following one.

What comfort we get from the fact that "Science and Health" presents an ordered unfoldment of divine facts, which can be learned and assimilated in an ordered way, and which evolve in the natural order of our very being. We can see why there is nothing academic about the structure of "Science and Health" in its Science. In fact, understanding it spiritually in its Science is vitally necessary to our way of Life.

The Textbook: Our Impersonal Teacher

The Bible and “Science and Health,” as seen in their spiritually scientific structure are a healthy basis for self-instruction in Science. This finds confirmation in Mary Baker Eddy’s statements: “You can well afford to give me up, since you have in my last revised edition of Science and Health, your teacher and guide” (Mis. 136:18), and “Students who strictly adhere to the right, and make the Bible and Science and Health a study, are in no danger of mistaking their way.” (Mis. 284:10).

Since John W. Doorly showed us the first faint gleams of what constitutes spiritual order, I made up my mind to devote my life unreservedly to the research of what it involves to see more of the Science of Christian Science. Over the last 60 years I have tried to present what constitutes the three main categories of Being which build the structure of the Science of the Textbook. One of my first important presentations of the Science of Christian Science is my book “The Structure of the Christian Science Textbook — Our Way of Life” (1954). Together with my books, “Epitomes for the Spiritually Structured Interpretation of the Christian Science Textbook” (1982) and “The Science of the Oneness of Being in the Christian Science Textbook” (1983) students have a workable aid in investigating for themselves, the Textbook in a deeper, structured sense. Mrs. Eddy asks that the Bible and the Textbook be the student’s “only textbook for self-instruction in Christian Science” (Man. p. 34).

In this connection, I should like to quote a few statements from the “Christian Science Journal,” April 1891, which appeared under Mrs. Eddy’s direction: On the occasion of the appearing of the 50th edition of the Textbook the question was asked: “Is not the new Science and Health intended to be the teacher for the future, thus to do away with incorrect teaching, and oral instruction of human teachers”? In the answer we read:

“The Work is intended for all ages, grades and classes; for the child just beginning to prattle, and for the aged grandsire; for the novice just entering upon the study of Christian Science and for the student who has made, as human language expresses it, the greatest advance. Without wishing to establish any *dictum*, the writer cannot refrain from giving expression to his conviction that this volume gradually *will* supersede all teaching, in the technical sense of the word; further, that it will prove great gain for the Cause of Truth when that day arrives.”

Naturally, we have always recognized the Bible and “Science and Health” as the great teachers, but as they speak to us through order and system, they will lead us wisely and gently along the way of Life. The more these two books are seen in their Science, the more they interpret themselves directly to us and Mrs. Eddy’s foresight will thus be fulfilled.

Our hearts should be full of gratitude that we live in the very age when the Science of Christian Science has been revealed to us, so that the deeper and higher meaning of the Science of the infinite One can be grasped.
